Ronnie Gordon: 1938—2009

Ronnie Gordon was born June 8, 1938, and he left this world on December 22, 2009, after being diagnosed with Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma in late summer of last year. Trout Unlimited members became acquainted with Ronnie through his volunteer efforts with Casting For Recovery, a fly fishing weekend retreat for women who are living with breast cancer and through his work with Reel Recovery, the men's cancer survivor fly fishing retreat program.

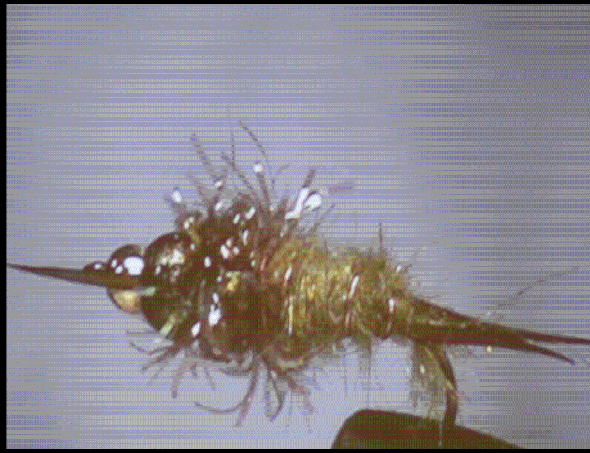
Ronnie's wife of 45 1/2 years is Ruby Gordon. Ronnie has two daughters, and two grandchildren. Ruby organizes the Casting for Recovery retreats and works closely with Reel Recovery as well.

I personally had the opportunity to know this gentle man and I would like to pay tribute to his life and to some of his many accomplishments. Ronnie retired in 2001 from a career with the Kentucky State Department of Transportation as an audit manager. He volunteered for the AARP Tax Aid Program, Friend For Life, Casting for Recovery, Reel Recovery, Actor's Theater, Bunbury Theater, and SCORE. His volunteer efforts were rewarded when he was presented with a Bell Award in 2006. Ronnie never really was an active fisherman himself, but he helped Ruby organize retreats that encouraged others to participate in the sport. The Louisville community has lost a faithful volunteer and Trout Unlimited has lost a friend.

Depth Charge Bird's Nest

Hook :	#6—12 Tiemco or equivalent
Thread:	Olive or yellow 8/0
Beads:	Small brass, and Large black Tungsten
Antennae:	Biots, ginger/brown
Tail:	Biots, ginger/brown
Wire:	Tungsten or lead substitute
Rib:	Small or med. Copper ultra wire
Abdomen:	Synthetic dubbing peacock/golden, or green
Legs & Thorax:	Root beer Estaz

Step 1: Slide brass bead small hole first on hook follow by tungsten with large hole first. This allows the large bead to nestle onto the brass bead, when needed. Tie thread behind the smaller bead, and tie in 2 goose bigots. Create a thread foundation for the larger bead to sit on. Whip finish and cement. Slide larger bead into place behind brass bead.

Step 2. Reattach thread behind larger bead, wrap shank with lead wire and secure with thread wrap back to hook bend. Add a small dubbing ball at bend, and tie in two biot tails, so they spread at dubbing ball. Tie in copper wire rib, then dub abdomen to about an 1/8 inch from behind large bead. Wrap copper wire, tie off and clip.

Step 3 Tie in Estaz, with 2 to 3 wraps behind the large bead for the thorax. Tie off, and cement.

This Fly is successful because it is an attractor pattern, and it mimics several different aquatic insects and has the silhouette of the most generic nymph pattern. It does resemble a stone fly larvae. Also, the translucent materials shimmer in the current to give the illusion of a live insect.
